OBE - The Cruise into Kindergarten Initiative

Purpose:

Cruise into Kindergarten is a multi-year initiative designed to provide high quality early childhood programming and outreach by public libraries throughout the state of Pennsylvania. As of October 1, 2016 the initiative is moving into year four.

Goals:

- Educate and train library staff to provide high quality early literacy experiences for families, while increasing librarians' knowledge of brain development, ECRR, and Early Learning & STEM Standards applied to programming
- Increase awareness of the importance of early learning in all communities in Pennsylvania. Collaborate with other state and local agencies involved with early learning.
- Promote the role of libraries in providing early learning support to parents, care providers, and early childhood educators.
- Improve the school readiness practices of adults who provide services and/or care for young children.


Outcomes & Indicators

 Outcome #1: Librarians participate in professional development opportunities designed to increase their knowledge of brain development, ECRR, and Early Learning & STEM Standards applied to high quality early literacy programming.

Indicator #1: Number of librarians utilizing the Cruise into Kindergarten internal website for professional development. This website contains information for librarians on brain development, ECRR, early learning best practices, and a wide variety of programming resources for children and families.

Target: 25 percent of children's librarians will utilize the internal website developed through the Cruise into Kindergarten initiative.

Evidence: Statistics gathered from the Cruise Libraries website, www.cruiselibraries.org support this indicator. In the past 12 months, the site has been visited 28,250 times. That's an average of 2,354 visits per month or 78 visits per day. Also significant, once librarians are on the site, they're exploring the resources. The total number of page views for the year was 157,548. Each visit is generating approximately 5 page views.

Indicator #2: Librarians trained on the Play K curriculum developed through the Cruise into Kindergarten initiative improved their knowledge of early literacy best practices.

Target: 50 percent of children's librarians in Pennsylvania will increase their knowledge of Pennsylvania's Learning Standards for Early Childhood and the early literacy skills and practices that form the foundation of Every Child Ready to Read @ your library (ECRR).

Evidence: A total of six Play K workshops were presented across the state in year three of the initiative, serving 145 libraries and 171 participants (librarians).

Pre and post-test data from the Play K workshops found participants gained substantial knowledge in these two key areas important to early literacy programming. Participants reported an average gain of 3 points on a 5-point Likert type scale.

Outcome #2: Public libraries collaborate with state and local agencies involved with early learning to provide high quality early learning experiences in all communities in Pennsylvania.

Indicator #1:

Children's librarians receiving Play K training will apply the curriculum and resources to improve their programming and outreach efforts.

Target: 70 percent of children's librarians who received Play K training apply the curriculum and resources to improve their programming and outreach efforts.

Evidence: Survey results after the trainings support this target:


- 70 percent of participants have connected with their local schools and/or childcares as a result of the Play K initiative.
- 83 percent of participants have provided enhanced storytime programs supporting the five practices of talk, sing, read, write, and play utilizing the Play K curriculum and materials.
- 86 percent of participants have provided Play K programming targeted to kindergarten readiness with the pre-k age group in their communities.
- 78 percent of participants now have a "passive play" area in their libraries.

Outcome #3: Parents, childcare providers, and early childhood educators utilize the early learning programs provided by public libraries.

Indicator #1: Number of parents and caregivers who utilize the online site developed through the Cruise into Kindergarten initiative. This website contains an interactive game board linking to a wide of online early learning activities for parents and children to explore and enjoy together.

Target: 25 percent of parents and caregivers who learn of the online game site developed through the Cruise into Kindergarten initiative utilize the site.

Evidence: Statistics gathered from the website support this target. Approximately 100,000 parents and caregivers have learned about the Cruise into Kindergarten game website, www.pacruisetok.org, through our public awareness campaign. In the past 12 months, this site has been visited 33,304 times. That's an average of 2,775 visits per month or 93 visits per day. Also significant, parents, caregivers and children are playing the game by visiting the sites on the game board while on the site. The total number of page views for the year was 208,415. Each visit to the site is generating approximately 6 page views, or clicks on the game board links.

Outcome #4: Adults who attend library programs are made aware of best practices to promote school readiness.

Indicator: Parents and caregivers who participate in Play K programming with their children report increased knowledge of early literacy best practices.

Target: 75 percent of parents indicate that participation in Play K improved their child's school readiness and their own awareness of how to support early literacy development in the home.

Evidence: Data will be collected on this target through parent surveys beginning in 2017.
